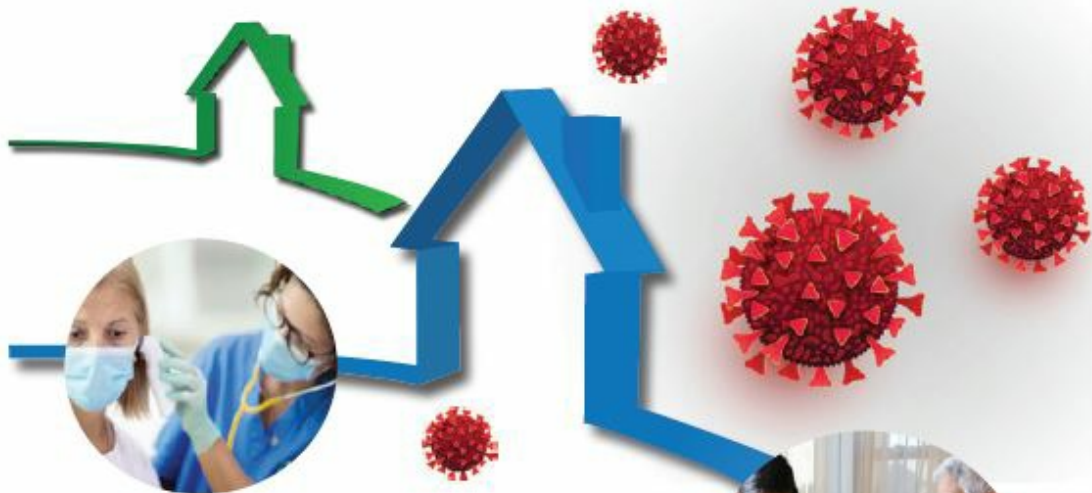

Home is more than a word. It's where your life happens.

The Harris County Housing Survey is your opportunity to tell Harris County how to responsibly develop improvements for economic, environmental, and social balance in the most valuable space of all – your home and community.

We value what home means to you. Tell us about it.

Who's conducting the survey?

The Harris County Housing Survey is commissioned by Harris County. The survey is being conducted by the Kinder Institute for Urban Research at Rice University and will provide a picture of real estate needs in the 34 cities located in Harris County.

Why is the survey important?

Severe weather and a growing population present new social needs for the five million residents who call Harris County home. The results of the Harris County Housing Survey will inform decisions that impact safe and affordable homes in your community. Your responses show your local government how to improve real estate in your neighborhood like determining where homes need to be built or repaired, types of dwelling options that are needed, and maintaining affordable costs for hardworking Harris County residents.

Who should take the survey?

This study includes all five million residents who call Harris County home. You should take the survey if:

- You are a resident who is still recovering from Hurricane Harvey.
- You are concerned about being able to stay in your home after Hurricane Harvey.
- You currently cannot afford a place to call home.
- You are interested in ways to improve your neighborhood.
- Your safety, access to opportunity, and economic strength are important.
- Your community matters and you want to be included in redevelopment plans for the future.

What will happen to my information?

The survey is completely anonymous, and you can provide us additional information about yourself if you'd like at the end of the survey. The study is about ensuring that people across Harris County have access to homes that help households thrive and access opportunity. That is a need that is shared across income levels and the goal of the study will be to identify ways that all residents can access safe, affordable homes. The information you give us will help inform the study to be concluded in early spring 2021.

First Day of Early Voting by Personal Appearance	Tuesday, October 13, 2020
Last Day to Apply for Ballot by Mail (Received, not Postmarked)	Friday, October 23, 2020
Last Day of Early Voting by Personal Appearance	Friday, October 30, 2020
Last day to Receive Ballot by Mail	Tuesday, November 3, 2020 (Election Day) at 7:00 p.m. if carrier envelope is not postmarked, OR Wednesday, November 4, 2020 (next business day after Election Day) at 5:00 p.m. if carrier envelope is postmarked by 7:00 p.m. at the location of the election on Election Day (unless overseas or military voter deadlines apply) ⁴

YES, IT'S EASY!

The census cannot share your info with anyone else, even other government agencies. It's the law!



YES, IT'S ABOUT REPRESENTING ALL OF US!

The more people we count, the more seats our state gets in the House of Representatives.



YES, IT'S ABOUT HELPING OUR COMMUNITIES!

Everyone should fill out the census so we don't lose millions of dollars in the next 10 years. After the 2010 census, our city and communities missed out on over \$10,000* per person not counted.



YES, IT'S FOR EVERYONE!

Anyone living in the U.S. should be counted, because every single person has the right to these resources.
